

A cultural eye-opener!

Can you imagine your wife and kids being abducted by your wife's older brothers while you're away on a business trip, and then being told they would not be released or allowed to communicate with you until you had paid the remainder of an exorbitant dowry (bride price)? Is this for real? It is happening to our good friend, John Sabuni, leader of Evangelical Free Church of Uganda.



John and Celine have been married for four years, have two small children. To get his family back, he must pay 8 more goats (in addition to the 8 cows he's already paid) as well as 2 million shillings (about \$850). This is nearly impossible for a Ugandan pastor.

Dowry is VERY common in Africa, and prevents many couples from getting married due to the extremely high prices demanded. My friend David is in his early 30's, and wants very much to get married, but is the son of a pastor and so has very little money to pay a dowry, and thus no chance for marriage.
